

# Program of Studies/Registration Packet

Dear Parents,

Hilliard City Schools is offering summer enrichment, remediation, and grade replacement classes for high school students.

Each course will meet for at least 60 hours, which is equivalent to the class time during the regular school year required for a 1/2 (.5) credit class. A full-credit (1) credit course will meet for at least 120 hours during both the first and second session. Courses offered are for students entering grades 9-12. All school policies regarding student conduct (discipline) will apply during summer school. Serious problems will result in withdrawal without a refund. No refunds will be given after class begins.

Course Offerings

## Business Education

### INFORMATION & COMMUNICATION TECHNOLOGY 21 (ICT 21)      Grade 9, 10, 11, 12

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245

Code No. 15SS01/02\*

FEE: \$7.00

This course provides students with twenty-first century skills that are essential in today's global society. Through the use of current software tools and applications, students will identify, select, and apply appropriate technology and resources to produce creative works and construct technology-enhanced products and presentations. In addition, students will use problem-solving skills and critical analysis to explore real world scenarios, study career options, develop electronic research strategies, and practice effective communication techniques. **This is a required course for graduation. Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

## Mathematics

### ALGEBRA 1

Grade 9, 10, 11, 12

ONE CREDIT—\$345

CODE NO. 50SS10

FEE: \$10.00

PREREQUISITE: Pre-Algebra

**Offered: Full Session (Students must take both Session I & Session II)**

Algebra 1 is designed to provide a solid foundation for all future work in mathematics. A strong background in fractions, decimals, and variable and logical reasoning is essential. Algebra 1 is primarily the study of solving and graphing linear equations and inequalities. We will also introduce students to quadratic equations and inequalities. **Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

### GEOMETRY

Grade 9, 10, 11, 12

ONE CREDIT—\$345

CODE NO. 50SS20

PREREQUISITE: Algebra 1

**Offered: Full Session (Students must take both Session I & Session II)**

Geometry is for those students who passed Algebra 1 with a "C" or better test average. Geometry is the study of visual patterns. This course explores the relationships between different types of plane and solid figures in order to improve a student's ability to see patterns, improve a student's problem solving skills and to apply geometric principles in the world around us. Topics to be studied include geometric proof reasoning, polygons, parallel and perpendicular lines, similarity, trigonometry, transformations, surface area and volume. Geometry is recommended for any college-bound student.

**Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

## Physical Education & Health

### PHYSICAL EDUCATION 1

**Grade 9, 10, 11, 12**

ONE-FOURTH CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 45SS11/12\*

Possible fee for field trips.

*Students will meet the same number of hours as the one-half credit courses. All PE tuition will be the same as one-half credit course tuition.*

**Offered:**            **Session I OR Session II**

Students are required to complete at least 1/2 units of credit in Physical Education for graduation, unless minimum participation requirements are met through athletics, marching band, and/or cheerleading. The class assumes an entirely co-educational structure. Students will have the opportunity to select blocks of activities including acrosport, archery, aerobics, badminton, basketball, floor hockey, golf, indoor lacrosse, recreational games, soccer, softball, strength training, table tennis, team handball, tennis, track, tumbling, and volleyball. The teacher will lecture and demonstrate the skills and rules of the activity; lead up games and tournaments complete the progression. Endurance (aerobic) exercise training, used to improve the fitness of the cardio-respiratory system, is conducted throughout the course. **Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

### PHYSICAL EDUCATION 2

**Grade 10, 11, 12**

ONE-FOURTH CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 45SS21/22\*

Possible fee for field trips.

PREREQUISITE: PE 1 or Fitness for Life

*Students will meet the same number of hours as the one-half credit courses. All PE tuition will be the same as one-half credit course tuition.*

**Offered:**            **Session I OR Session II**

Students are required to complete at least 1/2 units of credit in Physical Education for graduation, unless minimum participation requirements are met through athletics, marching band, and/or cheerleading. The class assumes an entirely co-educational structure. Students will have the opportunity to select blocks of activities including acrosport, archery, aerobics, badminton, basketball, floor hockey, golf, indoor lacrosse, recreational games, soccer, softball, strength training, table tennis, team handball, tennis, track, tumbling, and volleyball. The teacher will lecture and demonstrate the skills and rules of the activity; lead up games and tournaments complete the progression. Endurance (aerobic) exercise training, used to improve the fitness of the cardio-respiratory system, is conducted throughout the course. **Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

### HEALTH 10

**Grade 10, 11, 12**

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 45SS10/20\*

**Offered:**            **Session I OR Session II**

How can you stay in tip-top shape, mentally, physically, and socially? This course has some of the answers. Your ability to recognize, correct and maintain a healthful condition is of utmost importance to your success in life. Topics such as Safety-First Aid-CPR, nutrition, fitness, emotions and mental health, family and reproduction, disease prevention, AIDS education and health aid consumer products will be covered. There is a minimal charge for certification and protective shields used during CPR. **Attendance is mandatory the last day of class, as there will be a final examination.**

## **Online Coursework**

**\*\*Hilliard City Schools offers Online Coursework for students who need to recover credits towards graduation. The courses below will be offered in this online format. These courses are taught by a Hilliard City Schools certified teacher. Students are required to complete lessons online, and take a final examination on the last day of the first session. (Please see page 7 for Math online schedule). Students may work on these online courses from home, at the library, or at school. ### **LANGUAGE ARTS - (online)**

\*Students enrolling in English 9, 10, 11 or 12 courses must take "A" during Session I followed by "B" during Session II. (ie. English 9A during Session 1 followed by English 9B during Session 2). Session I tuition is \$245 with an additional cost of \$100 for Session II. Full tuition is \$345 for a one-credit course. Students will not be permitted to take Session I without Session II in order to receive 1.0 full credit. Students who take only the "A" portion of the class will not receive any credit.

#### **\*ENGLISH 9A**

#### **Grade 9**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$245      CODE NO. 30OL01

**Offered:            Session I**

This course is required of all 9<sup>th</sup> grade students except those accepted into Honors English 9, L.E.A.P. 9 or appropriate ELL course. It is the first semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course are required to take Online English 9b upon its completion. Literature selections will draw from short stories, non-fiction, and poetry. This course will include a study of grammar, vocabulary-spelling, and composition. Students have opportunities to read, write, and interpret literature and are actively involved in the writing process of thinking, prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing. Grammar and basic mechanics of writing are reviewed

#### **\*ENGLISH 9B**

#### **Grade 9**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$100      CODE NO. 30OL03

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 9a*

**Offered:            Session II**

This course is required of all 9<sup>th</sup> grade students except those accepted into Honors English 9, L.E.A.P. 9 or appropriate ELL course. It is the second semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course must take Online English 9a first. Literature selections will draw from short stories, non-fiction, and poetry. This course will include a study of grammar, vocabulary-spelling, and composition. The study and completion of a formal research paper is required coursework. Students have opportunities to read, write, and interpret literature and are actively involved in the writing process of thinking, prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing. Grammar and basic mechanics of writing are reviewed.

### LANGUAGE ARTS (online continued)

#### **\*ENGLISH 10A**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$245      CODE NO. 30OL05

**Offered:**            **Session I**

This course is required of all 10<sup>th</sup> grade students except those accepted into Honors English 10, L.E.A.P. 10 or appropriate ELL course. It is the first semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course are required to take Online English 10b upon its completion. Through a general literature survey, students read and analyze short stories, non-fiction and poetry. Students have opportunities to read, write, and interpret literature and are actively involved in the writing process of thinking, prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing. Grammar and basic mechanics of writing are reviewed.

#### **Grade 10**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 9, English 9, Honors English 9, appropriate ELL course, or L.E.A.P. 9*

#### **\*ENGLISH 10B**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$100      CODE NO. 30OL06

**Offered:**            **Session II**

This course is required of all 10<sup>th</sup> grade students except those accepted into Honors English 10, L.E.A.P. 10 or appropriate ELL course. It is the second semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course must take Online English 10a first. Through a general literature survey, students read and analyze short stories, non-fiction and poetry. The study and completion of a formal research paper is required coursework. Students have opportunities to read, write, and interpret literature and are actively involved in the writing process of thinking, prewriting, drafting, revising, and editing. Grammar and basic mechanics of writing are reviewed.

#### **Grade 10**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 10a, and Online English 9, English 9, Honors, English 9, appropriate ELL course, or L.E.A.P. 9*

#### **\*ENGLISH 11A**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$245      CODE NO. 30OL45

**Offered:**            **Session I**

This course is required of all 11<sup>th</sup> grade students except those enrolled in A.P. Language and Composition. It is the first semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course are required to take Online English 11b upon its completion. Students will read, analyze, and critique both nonfiction and fiction selections including short stories, essays, poetry, and biographies/autobiographies from a wide variety of American authors. Romanticism, Transcendentalism, Realism, Regionalism, Naturalism are studied. In addition, students will utilize data bases, internet-based resources, electronic and media resources, and write a variety of creative and expository papers with an emphasis on the writing process and the use of correct writing conventions.

#### **Grade 11**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 10, English 10, Honors English 10, L.E.A.P. 10, or appropriate ELL course*

#### **\*ENGLISH 11B**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$100      CODE NO. 30OL46

**Offered:**            **Session II**

This course is required of all 11<sup>th</sup> grade students except those enrolled in A.P. Language and Composition. It is the second semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course must take Online English 11a first. Students will read, analyze, and critique both nonfiction and fiction selections including short stories, essays, poetry, and biographies/autobiographies from a wide variety of American authors. Modernism, the Harlem Renaissance, and contemporary American literature are studied. In addition, students will utilize data bases, internet-based resources, electronic and media resources, and write a variety of creative and expository papers with an emphasis on the writing process and the use of correct writing conventions.

#### **Grade 11**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 11a and Online English 10, English 10, Honors English 10, L.E.A.P. 10, or appropriate ELL course*



## **Online Coursework**

### **LANGUAGE ARTS (online continued)**

#### **\*ENGLISH 12A**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$245      CODE NO. 30OL72

**Offered:**            **Session I**

This course is required of all 12<sup>th</sup> grade students except those enrolled in A.P. Literature and Composition. It is the first semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course are required to take Online English 12b upon its completion. Students will read, analyze, and critique both nonfiction and fiction selections including short stories, essays, poetry, and biographies/autobiographies from a wide variety of British authors. The Anglo-Saxon and Medieval periods as well as the Renaissance and Age of Reason are studied. In addition, students will utilize data bases, internet-based resources, electronic and media resources, and write a variety of creative and expository papers with an emphasis on the writing process and the use of correct writing conventions.

#### **Grade 12**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 11, English 11 or A.P. Language and Composition*

#### **\*ENGLISH 12B**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$100      CODE NO. 30OL74

**Offered:**            **Session II**

This course is required of all 12<sup>th</sup> grade students except those enrolled in A.P. Literature and Composition. It is the second semester of a full credit course. Students who take this course must take Online English 12a first. Students will read, analyze, and critique both nonfiction and fiction selections including short stories, essays, poetry, and biographies/autobiographies from a wide variety of British authors. Romantic and Victorian literature as well as modern and contemporary writers are studied. In addition, students will utilize data bases, internet-based resources, electronic and media resources, and write a variety of creative and expository papers with an emphasis on the writing process and the use of correct writing conventions.

#### **Grade 12**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** *Online English 12a and Online English 11, English 11 or A.P. Language and Composition*

### **CONTEMPORARY LITERATURE**

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO.30OL04

**Offered:**            **Session I**

This course is for students who need to earn a general 1/2 credit of English. It meets many of the English Language Arts academic content standards for grades 9-12, but is not specific to any grade. The course is divided into two parts. In the first part, students learn about the media and how to become educated consumers of the media. They explore a variety of media outlets to understand this widely accessible and controversial style of nonfiction. In the second part, students read a contemporary adult novel and participate in interactive and creative activities based on the characters, plot and themes in the novel.

#### **Grades 9, 10, 11, 12**

### **MEDIA AWARENESS**

ONE –HALF CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 30OL02

**Offered:**            **Session I**

This online enrichment course is an elective and does not count towards the four credits in English required for graduation. Introducing students to all aspects of today's media, the Media Awareness course is designed for those who want to expand their writing and reporting skills and increase their overall understanding of today's media and how it works. The course is much less of a traditional journalism course (writing and design) and much more of a "how to become an educated consumer of media" course.

## Online Coursework

### MATH - (online)

- Algebra 2, Integrated Geometry and Algebra 1(IGA 1) and Geometry and Algebra Connections 2 (GAC 2) are offered online as credit recovery courses. These courses are open to students who have previously failed the class in which they are enrolling. Students will be expected to complete and turn in downloadable worksheets and activities, as well as a test for each chapter, the semester exam, and final exam.
- Students must have access to a computer with an Internet connection.
- Students must have access to the following applications.
  - Microsoft Word or similar word processor
  - Internet Explorer, Firefox, Netscape Navigator, or similar browser\*
  - Acrobat Reader\*
  - Applications with an "\*" are available free on the Internet
- Students must have on file in the district a signed Network Acceptable Use Policy if any work is done on school computers.

### ALGEBRA 2

ONE CREDIT—\$345

CODE NO. 50OL06

### **Grade 10, 11, 12**

**\*\*PREREQUISITES:** Geometry, GAC2**Offered:** Session I & II

Algebra 2 is for those students who passed Geometry with "C" or lower test average or completed GAC2. Topics include numbers and variables, equations and inequalities, exponents, and functions. Objectives include developing the following skills: interpreting mathematical symbols, performing fundamental operations using symbols of algebra, evaluating algebraic expressions, solving equations and verbal problems, factoring, using the laws of exponents, drawing and reading graphs, and using logarithms. Heavy emphasis will be placed on applying algebraic concepts to solve real-world problems and calculators are extensively used. A TI-83+ or TI-84 Graphing Calculator is required. TI-89 or 92 calculators are **NOT** allowed.

### MATH (online continued)

\*Students enrolling in the IGA or GAC courses must take "A" during Session I followed by "B" during Session II. (ie. IGA 1A during Session 1 followed by IGA 1B during Session 2). Session I tuition is \$245 with an additional cost of \$100 for Session II. Full tuition is \$345 for a one-credit course. Students will not be permitted to take Session I without Session II in order to receive 1.0 full credit. Students who take only the "A" portion of the class will not receive any credit.

#### \* GEOMETRY AND ALGEBRA CONNECTIONS 1A

\*\*PREREQUISITE: Alg 1

**Offered: Session I**

FEE: \$10.00

GAC 1A is for those students who have passed Algebra 1 with a "C" or "D" average. It is designed to be the first step, followed by GAC 2, in an alternative course track for Geometry and Algebra 2. GAC 1 will review the major Algebra 1 concepts needed to succeed in Geometry and beyond, cover some of the Geometry concepts without the use of proofs, and introduce early Algebra 2 concepts.

GAC 2 will review some major Algebra 1 concepts, cover a few Geometry concepts without the use of proofs, and cover more Algebra 2 concepts.

GAC 2B is for those students who have passed GAC 2A. It is designed to be the final step in the GAC series which is an alternative course track for Geometry and Algebra 2. GAC 2 will review some major Algebra 1 concepts, and complete the coverage of Algebra 2 concepts.

### **SCIENCE - (online)**

#### **SCIENCE 9A & 9B**

#### **Grade 9**

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245; ONE CREDIT—\$345 CODE NO. 55OL51/52\*

**Offered:** Session I

FEE: \$11.50

MAY BE TAKEN AS 1/2 or ONE CREDIT\*

\*Students who wish to complete ONE CREDIT will complete more work than students who wish to complete 1/2 CREDIT.

SCIENCE 9A & 9B ARE TWO SEQUENTIAL SEMESTER COURSES TO BE TAKEN YOUR FRESHMAN YEAR. This is a hands-on, lab-based course that is designed for night grade student. The following topics will be covered; scientific inquiry, metrics, and measurement; matter, atoms and the periodic table; forces and motion; energy; waves; earth systems; processes that shape the earth; the universe; and scientific inquiry.

#### **ENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE**

#### **Grade 10, 11, 12**

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 55OL53

\*\*PREREQUISITIES: Science 9A/9B,  
Honors Science 9

**Offered:** Session I

FEE: \$7.00

This course involves examining the ways organisms, especially humans, interact with their environment. It will focus on issues such as loss of biodiversity, habitat change, global climate change and sustainable development. Studying the earth's present biodiversity and ecosystems are essential to understanding threats to them. Another focus will be sociological and political aspects of this dynamic field of science. Student may take environmental science and biology concurrently.

#### **FRESHWATER and MARINE ECOSYSTEMS**

#### **Grade 10, 11, 12**

ONE-HALF CREDIT—\$245

CODE NO. 55OL54

\*\*PREREQUISITE: Biology

**Offered:** Session I

FEE: \$16.00

This course examines oceans and seas from many angles. It includes what is known about ocean size, ocean base topography, sea-floor spreading, deep-sea sediments, waves and currents, tides, seawater chemistry and marine life. Future uses of ocean resources and possible international problems that might arise from the development of these resources will be discussed. Comparisons of form and function of various marine organisms will be covered. The lab work will involve the study of related freshwater systems such as lakes, ponds, rivers and streams and the dissection nektonic and benthic organisms.

They entail a study of our government— focusing on the legal foundations and institutions as they relate to current political, social and economic issues. **SESSION BEGINS JUNE 6th**      **COST: First subject—\$100, each additional subject—\$50.**

*Students who have at least 10th grade status will need to pass all five sections of the Ohio Graduation Test in order to receive a high school diploma.* The Hilliard City School District offers summer school classes for students who would like tutoring for the OGT. These five preparation classes will be invaluable to students who need intervention on the OGT. This program combines test-taking skills with appropriate subject matter to guide students toward a better performance on the test. Although no program can offer guarantees, we feel that the quality of these summer school preparation classes will provide students with much needed assistance.

**Purpose:** To assist Hilliard City School District students in grades 10-12 (2010-2011 school year) who need intervention in acquiring skills necessary to find success on the Ohio Graduation Test. **Students in grade 9 may enroll in Test Preparation courses but may not take the OGT until March of their 10th grade year (according to the state of Ohio).** However, all 9th graders who enroll in Test Preparation courses through summer school will leave with an assessment of their current progress toward OGT requirements.

**Registration:** Student numbers will be limited to 25 per class. Students may register for one subject area or all four.

**Cost:** \$100 for first subject; \$50.00 for each additional subject. This fee will cover any/all preparation classes taken by a student.

Students may request to repeat courses. In order to repeat a course for a replacement grade, this form must be completed and submitted to the guidance office before the sixteenth day of school. The course information and the grade earned the first time remain on the transcript as part of the student’s academic record. However, the grade earned the second time is the grade that is computed in the calculation of the grade point average. This means students will always receive the second grade earned. Credit is only awarded once for the course. A student may repeat, at most, two year-long courses or four semester courses in one school year. Students must complete the entire semester/year to be eligible to repeat a course.

- ~ A course and its prerequisite may not be taken at the same time.
- ~ A course may be repeated only once.
- ~ Grades from out of the district sources, correspondence courses, and summer school courses will not be accepted as replacement grades (exceptions — those courses taken in the summer sessions offered by Hilliard City Schools).
